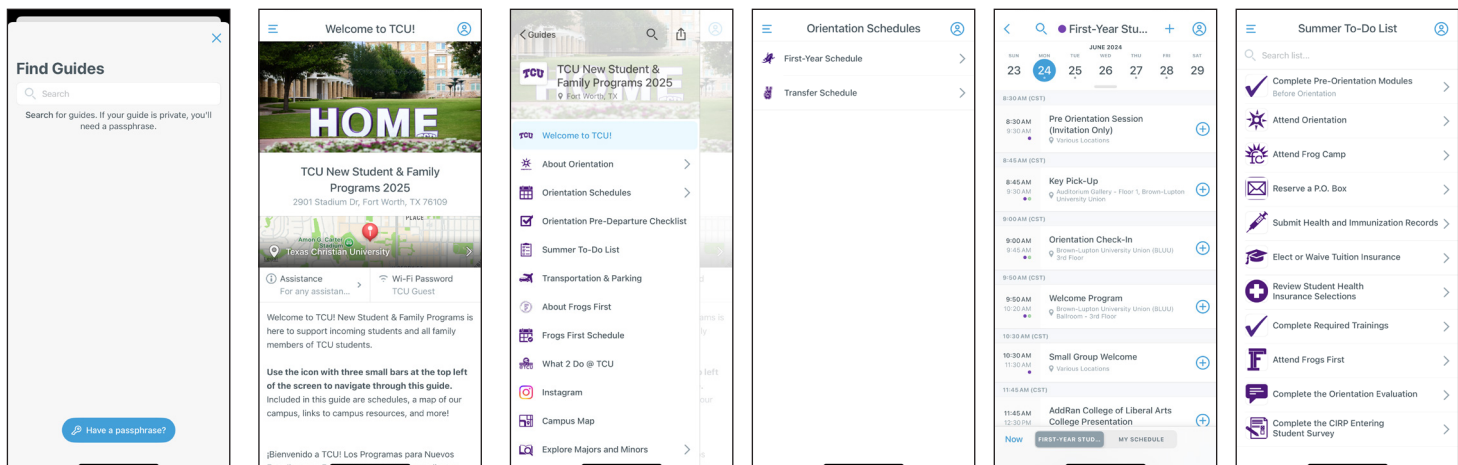


Welcome to TCU, New Horned Frogs!

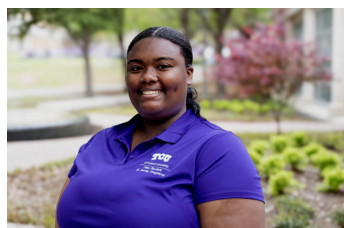

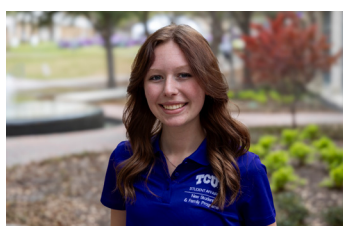

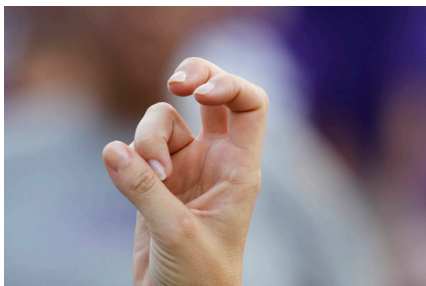




TCU History & Traditions



TCU's story began in 1873 when brothers Addison and Randolph Clark dreamed of creating a college where men and women could acquire a classical education and develop character. With just 13 students, they opened the doors of AddRan Male and Female College in Thorp Springs, Texas. The Clarks forged an affiliation with the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) to "adopt" their school in 1873, giving it a new name and ensuring its future. AddRan Christian University officially became Texas Christian University in 1902. After a fire destroyed the campus in 1910, TCU moved to Fort Worth, TX.



TCU is a place of spirited belonging where Horned Frogs have long found connection through our culture and traditions.

The Go Frogs Hand Sign

The quickest way to show spirit on campus is to throw up the Go Frogs hand sign. Cheerleader Chad Schrotel '82 helped our gesture of unity catch on with the crowds in 1980. Simply make a peace sign with your hands and curl your fingers, symbolizing the horns of our tiny, mighty mascot, the horned frog.

A Century-Old Cheer

At more than 100 years old, "Riff Ram" is rumored to be the oldest chant in the Southwest Conference, where we rose to popularity in the early days of intercollegiate sports. The chant is accompanied by a signature dance and is repeated multiple times with increasing pace. Riff, Ram, Bah, Zoo!

SuperFrog

TCU has featured costumed mascots on the sidelines of football games since the 1930s. SuperFrog, created in 1979, had to evolve a bit before being named a Top 25 College Mascot by Sports Illustrated.

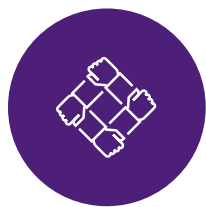

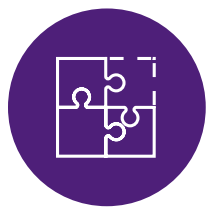
Student Identity and Engagement (identity.tcu.edu)

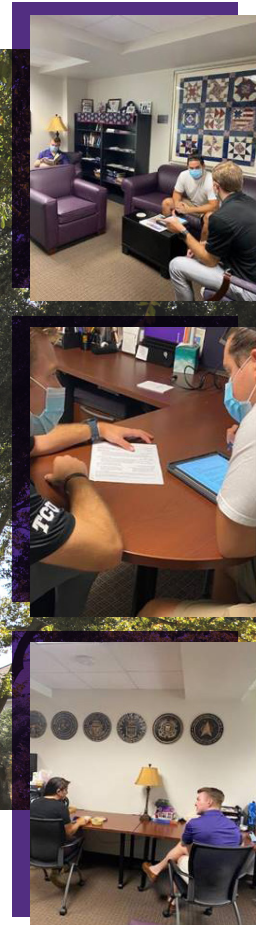


Veterans Services

Granting & Revoking Access to Records

If you would like a parent, guardian, or other third-party individual to view your grades, account/billing information and several other important pieces of information you must grant them access. There is a feature in myTCU called Grant Access to Others that gives you the ability to create an account for these people. You as the student are the only person that can create and manage these accounts.

1. Log in to myTCU (my.tcu.edu) with your username and password.
2. On the Student Homepage, click on the Grant Access to Others tile.
3. Click on Add Account, please note you can only create three accounts.
4. Complete the New Account form, including the appropriate buttons for the records you wish to authorize.
5. Click the Save button.
6. To add additional guests, click on the Add Account button.

The myTCU portal provides students, faculty, and staff with personalized access to various campus resources from a single website. Through myTCU, you can use class search to identify classes offered in a semester, activate Purple Schedule Builder to explore alternative schedules, register for classes, view the academic calendar, and see TCU announcements. To access it, click on myTCU on the top navigational bar on the TCU home page (tcu.edu) or visit my.tcu.edu to log in.

Pulse

Pulse is an app which gives you access to the course calendar, assignments, grades, and announcements. This app provides a graph that can help you manage your time. Based on the number of assignments and events on the course calendar for your classes, the graph will display busy times for class work in the upcoming week. You can use this app to manage your daily workload. Pulse is available from the Google Play or App Store.

Stellic (tcu.edu/academics/advising/stellic)

Stellic is a platform that helps you plan your semesters with the most suitable courses. It combines planning and advising features to provide a seamless experience for you. It allows you to organize your personalized course plans, track your progress, and visualize your pathways.

TCU Campus Recreation

TCU Campus Recreation is the app to connect you to all things Campus Recreation and Wellness Promotion. Find group fitness classes, make racquetball reservations, intramural information and much more. The TCU Campus Recreation app can be downloaded from the App Store and Google Play.

TCU Engage (engage.tcu.edu)

Discover unique opportunities at TCU Engage! Find and attend events, browse and join organizations, and showcase your involvement.

TCU Mobile

The official app for TCU students, faculty, staff, and alumni. Stay connected with TCU resources, news and events through this app. This app connects to your email, my.tcu.edu, official news on campus, announcements, maps and more. TCU Mobile is available from the Google Play or App Store.

TCU Online (tcuonline.tcu.edu)

Brightspace by D2L, referred to as TCU Online, is TCU's learning management system. In TCU Online, students can review course syllabi and announcements, take quizzes and exams, respond to online discussions, submit assignments, email instructors and classmates, view grades, and more.



Move In & Post Office



While TCU provides many resources and programs to help you transition to university life, we also encourage you to talk to your parents and family about expectations for grades, finances, and other relevant topics before you arrive on campus. Move-In

Move-in is the day on which students can move into their new home at TCU. For the 2025-2026 academic year, the move-in schedule will be available at the Housing & Residence Life website.

Check List:

- **Move-In**
 - An email will be sent to your TCU inbox with an assigned move-in/check-in timeslot. This information will be posted on your Housing Portal. Follow these instructions to check-in before moving into your residence hall.
- **Obtain Your Student ID Card**
 - As part of the move-in process you will receive your TCU student ID card. You will need your student ID to use your meal plan, enter your residential hall and the Campus Recreation Center, and to use the computer labs and printers on campus. Your student ID will also allow you to make purchases at vending machines and at athletic concession stands.
- **Meet Your Resident Assistant**
 - During move in, you will receive information about welcome meetings and upcoming events including Frogs First.

TCU Box Rental Information

Students must have a TCU Box to receive items on campus. No packages can be delivered to residence halls. You can request a TCU Box starting July 1 by logging in to my.tcu.edu, select the Admitted Student Task Tile, click on Request TCU Box, select yes, and click save.

Students that have requested a TCU Box and have registered for classes will receive an email with their TCU Box address and may begin shipping. A \$55 rental fee covers fall and spring and is charged to the student account. The TCU Box auto renews each year until the student closes the TCU Box online. Moving off campus does not close a TCU Box.

- ☐ If you do not plan to use the TCU Health Insurance, log onto myTCU to waive your participation. Once logged in select Student Services, then Health Insurance Waive/Elect.
- ☐ Ensure you know what you can and need to bring to move into your residence hall. (**housing.tcu.edu/move-in-move-out**)
- ☐ Attend Frog Camp! There may still be spots available, so don't miss your chance to connect, have fun, and kick off your TCU experience!
- ☐ Enjoy your summer and start packing for Move-In!
